# **OLD FAST PAPER**

The great diversity of the automobile since the turn of the century lends itself to an almost limitless number of items for the collector. There are spark plugs, license plates, hub caps, literature, name plates . . . the choices are endless. I have seen a collection of over one hundred Model T water pumps; another of seventy-five T timers.

Even the collecting of literature has many areas. Today the trend seems to be more modern, with the muscle cars and collector cars. We seem to be going through a nostalgia kick.

Auto racing has its separate collectors. The early years of racing are divided into Professional and Amateur. The Ford, for the most part, must be the amateur. Most Ford racers and speedsters were built to be driven on the street while dreaming of the big time.

This piece will be about Model T Speedster literature, or as Neal East calls it, "Old Fast Paper. We'll also include a collectible or two.

Robert M. Roof, who called himself Chief Engineer, began advertising in quantity by 1917. He continued with several name changes until after World War II. I have seen over 100 different pieces which he had printed. These are not just the ads in magazines, but hand-out sheets and brochures.

Magazines from 1919 until the end of the Model T Ford era, that car-oriented people might read, had a continuous series of ads on building a Model

T speedster. The more popular names, such as Rajo, Fronty, Roof, Ames, Morton & Brett, and Mercury, changed these ads every issue. To collect all of the different ads would require a lifetime.

An after market Ford magazine that started out as *The Ford Owner*, went to *The Ford Owner and Dealer*, and finally the *Ford Dealers* News, ran T speedster advertising from the late teens to the end. Consisting of how-to-do-it articles, speed tips, and the latest in speedster ideas, two recent books have been compiled just from the content of these magazines. These old magazines still show up from time to time at swap meets.

Areas of Speedster Literature to Look For FACTORY LETTERS

When you wrote to the speedster companies in answer to the ads they ran in Ford related magazines, you might get a Factory Letter. It was often four pages and would have their letter to you on the cover page, and advertising for the product on the other three pages. The Rajo letters quite often were in color and are probably the most attractive.

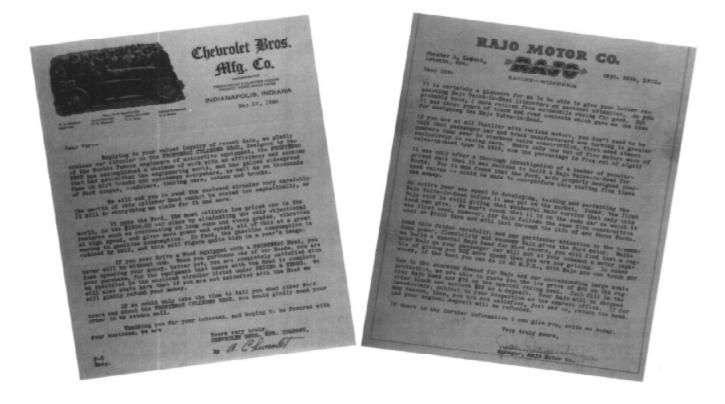
#### **AUTOGRAPHS**

Most of the companies were rather small so it was possible to receive a letter addressed to you and signed by the president. When you consider what

The factory letters are interesting because they are one of the few places that color was used. As you read them you will see that if you were the first customer to inquire or respond to an ad from your area, you could become a dealer and qualify for a discount. It is interesting that the companies were so small that the owners or designers were still signing their letters personally.



autograph collectors pay for famous signatures, these are a fantastic bargain.

#### **ENVELOPES**

If your letter brought a response in the form of an envelope with a fancy return logo on the envelope, I can imagine the thrill it must have produced. Notice the race cars on the Craig-Hunt envelope. (Later they became Speedway Engineering Co., at the same address.)

#### **BROCHURES**

These would include how-to-do-it manuals. The small brochures titled, Complete Instructions for Building a Fronty Ford Racing Car, by A. Chevrolet, originally sold for \$2.00, or were given away free, but are now very scarce and expensive.

The Ford as a Racing Car, by P.W. Cornelius, 1924, is the only one that might be considered a book. Dividing its ninety-one pages into three sections; (A) Chassis, (B) Power Plant, and (C) General Information, it is a collecting treasure perhaps a fantasy.



Fronty catalog No. 81 had a red cover, and is rare. It was issued February 15, 1927. Page seven has an interesting comparison of the speeds you might expect to reach. Fronty R, 96 mph; SR, 104 mph; DO, 110 mph; straightaway. This is the only time I have ever seen a company come out and give a figure.

Collecting Old Fast Paper has many rewards. The people you meet have usually kept a piece or two of some speedster item from the 1920 s or 1930 s. I have been very lucky to see, photograph, or record on tape their experiences. The Frontenac catalog shown came from Mr. Vernice Cranfill. He has become a friend, and he sent me this catalog when he built his speedster. I especially like the notation he had made on the cover, "Fronty Ford Driver.



The picture shown on the cover of catalog No. 80 has caused a lot of confusion. The picture usually has a caption, "Ford seated in the car that placed 5th in 1923. This is true BUT the picture was taken in 1924. Ford had agreed to be the race referee, and since a Ford had placed fifth the year before, all would be well. Also, the engine in the sole Ford in the 1923 race was an S-R Fronty, not the double overhead cam which was used on one of the entries in 1924. The other two Fords in the 1924 race still used the S-R. The S-R Fronty in either rocker arm or the single overhead cam configuration is still thought to be the cream of the crop. Not as pretty, but more reliable than the DO model.

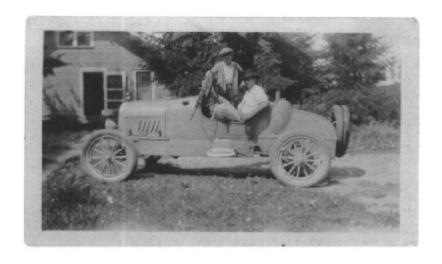


# **Original Photos**

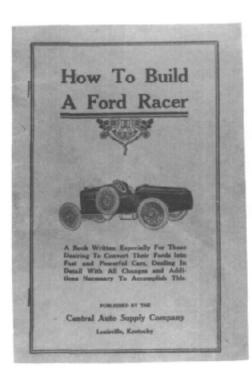

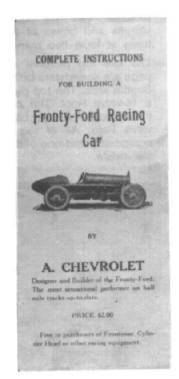


Assembly room of the Laurel Motors Co. A skid of unmachined 16-valve Roof heads.

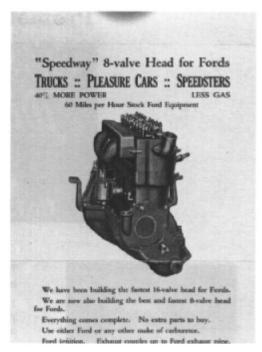
