## RACING IN THE 1920s -A Photo Album-

In the 1920s, Ray and Chet Gardner traveled the West racing their Rajo Model T Fords. For both men this was the beginning of lifetimes devoted to auto racing. Both were fine drivers. Because of family obligations, Ray Gardner restricted his driving activities-he was a mechanic at Indianapolis up until the 1970s. Chet Gardner was a winning driver at legendary Legion Ascot and raced at Indy from 1929 to 1938. His best finish was a fourth in 1933. Chet Gardner was killed racing in 1938.

This is not meant to be the story of the Gardners, although a book could be written about these men and the generations of Gardners still involved in racing today. These photos tell a bit of what it was like to race in the mid-1920s.



Above: While a far cry from the eighteen wheelers that haul race cars today, these Model T rigs were pretty much state-of-the-art in 1926. Many racers simply towed the race car or, in some cases, drove it to the track.





\*Howard Gardner raced in the 1950s and was a winning driver in California Racing Association s roadster and sprint car divisions.


